And Matthew Bethell travelled over to Northern Ireland with the East Anglian Junior Squad for the Junior Inter-Regional Championships.


The Club went to the East Anglian Championships in November, and came back with 5 champions - Jonathan Gilbert has written more about it below.

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# **East Anglian Championships**

Congratulations to our East Anglian Champions, the championships being held at Bromehill & Santon Warren on 27th November:

- W85 Barbara George
- M40 Glen Richardson
- M60 Rini Hoogkamer
- M65 Roger Parker
- M70 Mick Liston

The 4 men all won by less than 1 minute, with Roger only winning by 5 seconds. Apologies, if I missed anyone off, but the official results are not on the EAOA website, so I collated these myself.

This article came about as a result of an e-mail conversation with Glen. He had picked up the M40 (for himself) and M60 (for Rini) trophies, and on comparing the trophies he found that no M40 winner had subsequently gone on to win the M60 class, and wondered if this was common.

This got me thinking about all sorts of stats, so here we go.

When analysing the results, the following had to be factored in:

- There are complete sets of results going back to 2004, but before this there are some obvious gaps.
- The oldest set of results is from 1985, when the championships were held by CHIG in Epping Forest.
- Interestingly there are also some Happy Herts winners in the results, so I guess there must have been some sort of realignment of the regions at some point.
- The M/W80 class was added in 2014.
- The M/W85 class was added in 2019.

### Most competed for class:

#### **Since 2004**

All of these classes have been competed for at every championship: W45, W50, W55, W60, M10, M14, M45, M50, M55, M60, M65, M75

#### **Since 1985**

The only class that has been competed for at every championship (and for which there is a record of the result) is M45.

The following classes have had a winner for all but 1 championship: W55, M50, M55

### Least competed for class:

As might be expected this is a female junior class. Since 2004, W20 has only been competed for on 8 occasions. Note, that I have not included M/W80 & M/W85 as these classes have only recently been instated.

### Most classes competed for at a championship:

At the 2017 championships, held by SMOC at Rushmere, all 34 classes (no M/W85) were competed for. But for a lack of W20, the 2012 championships at Lynford would have had a clean sweep of classes.

### **Most wins by a competitor:** [Editor's note – NOR members' names appear in **bold**]

Chris Morley (WAOC) has won the most titles (21); the first being in 1991 as an M50 and the last being in 2021 as an M80. Our own **Barbara George** has won the most female titles (18); the first being in 1991 as W55 and the last being in 2022 as a W85. NOR's most successful man is **John Peel** back in the 90's and early 2000's.

Unsurprisingly, **Barbara** and Chris also have the most wins since 2004. The most successful NOR men, since 2004, are **John T Ward and Glen Richardson**.

The most successful junior is Thomas Louth (WAOC), with 7 wins. The most successful NOR junior is **Ella** (**Gilbert**) with 5 junior titles.

### Most consecutive wins by a competitor:

To achieve a string of consecutive wins can be difficult due to such things as injury, illness, officiating or having something better to do on the day. **Barbara George** won 8 consecutive titles from 2007 to 2014, missed a year and then won another 4! Dil Wetherill (WAOC) had 5 consecutive wins from 2005 to 2009. Thomas Louth (WAOC) and **Ella** had 6 consecutive wins amongst the juniors – for those still following, **Ella** also won the Women's Open / W21.

#### Biggest gap between wins:

These are all from NOR. **Peter Leverington** won in 1986 and then not again until 2006; **Fiona Coventry** won in 1986 and 2002; and **Karen Goldsworthy** won in 2000 and 2016.

### Biggest gap between first and last wins:

Amazingly, John Collyer won M40 in 1985 (the first year we have records) and also in 2022 as an M75. **Barbara George** has a similarly impressive record of first winning in 1991 as a W55 and also in 2022 as a W85.



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# **Tech Tips by Julia Paul**

## **Technical Tips #4**

A note about cancellations: with the very cold weather we had at Kelling Heath, I received a couple of calls about whether the event was going ahead. If ever we have to cancel it will be published on the **website**, on **Facebook**, and if you have pre-entered, you will also receive an **email**.

The previous articles have been aimed at beginners, and cover the basic navigation techniques. I thought this time I should do something about more advanced techniques.

As you get more advanced, you will be leaving the footpaths more, cutting corners or even going straight through a block of woodland. You may be looking for something small that is obscured by the trees. These techniques help you when you're off the path.

There are other items on the map, drawn using a line, so rather obviously called **line features**. You can find a fence or a wall that you can follow as if it were a path. You could follow a ditch, mapped in blue, or an earthwall, mapped in brown. Have a look at a map and see how many linear features you can spot. If you want to check exactly what they all mean, get a copy of the symbols used on our maps from <a href="https://www.maprunner.co.uk/mapsymbols/">https://www.maprunner.co.uk/mapsymbols/</a>.

An **attack point** is a large feature, close to your control point. Choose something large and visible from a fair distance. Examples of good attack points might be a large knoll or a large thicket; poor attack points might be a large depression or a distinctive tree, which can't be seen until you are close.

Navigate to your attack point; once you are there, you know exactly where you are on your map. You can check your map is orientated again, work out the distance, and if you're lucky, when you look up you may see that glimpse of orange that is what you're looking for! Even if not, you can proceed with confidence that you are close and looking in the right area.

I thought I'd finish with a **challenge** for you all: can you produce an orienteering term, or something orienteering related, for every letter of the alphabet? No promise of a prize, just for fun!

## **CompassSport Cup and Trophy**

This is a national competition between Clubs – the Cup is for larger Clubs, the Trophy for smaller Clubs. We will be competing for the Trophy.

There are strict rules if your score is to count for your Club. Primarily, you need to enter the course for your age class (in the right-hand column). The table below shows how these are allocated, and the colour-coded equivalent.

1	Brown	Men Open
2	Short Brown	M20- M40+
3	Blue Women	Women Open
4	Blue Men	M50+
5	Green Women	W20- W45+
6	Green Men	M60+
7	Veterans Short Green	M70+ W60+
8A	Junior Men (Green)	Men 18-
8B	Junior Women (Short Green)	Women 18-
9A	Orange Men	Men 14-
9B	Orange Women	Women 14-
10	Super Veterans Short Green	M80+ W70+

We would really like to see everyone competing on the correct course as you don't have to win to score points! (It's far more complicated than that!). We should also have Light Green, Yellow and White courses available.
